iPads: The New Proverbial Pencil

It's hard to imagine, but at one point the pencil was considered revolutionary and innovative. Times certainly have changed and the "proverbial pencil" as an educational tool has undergone many evolutions, giving way to laptops and now iPads. As a result of the Spring Grants Cycle, CEEF is providing the seed money to begin implementation of a one-to-one mobile learning initiative using iPads at the High School.

This grant, totaling more than \$43,000, will help fund the cost of the iPads and training for the teaching staff. While the current configuration of laptop carts at the high school has been successful and well used, the belief is that the iPad is a superior device to the laptop for the classroom setting given its lower cost, portability and myriad applications

designed for reading, research and classroom instruction.

These new technologies present opportunities to expand the learning horizon, cultivate student-driven education and encourage more creativity in both teaching and learning. CEEF grants mutually benefit teachers and students: every grant supports a teacher's delivery and a student's experience of curriculum. After two busy cycles in 2010 awarding grants totaling \$49,000, we took some time to evaluate our grant making. After much discussion among the board and input from our education advisors, we are taking a fresh approach to awarding grants. In the past, we have offered two grant cycles, one in both the Spring and Fall. New this year, Major Grants Program (those over \$1,000) are available in the Spring. In lieu of a Fall cycle, the new Rolling Grants Program makes smaller grants (up to \$1,000) available on a monthly basis.

In March, the Grants Committee launched its new Rolling Grants Program. "The thought behind the smaller grants is to allow staff the ability to seize opportunities as they come up rather than waiting for one of the grant cycles either in the fall or spring," says Grant Committee Co-chair, Jen Scarpitti Nelson. This year we have identified \$10,000 of grant money that will be awarded as part of the Rolling Grants Program. The Major Grants Program will remain as is with \$50,000 to be awarded this spring. Any funds not used during the major grants cycle will be used for rolling grants. "We are hopeful that this will be a positive change and will be reviewing it," says Scarpitti Nelson.

Every year the awarding of grants introduces us to new teachers and ideas, or rekindles our relationship with veteran educators who build upon previous requests. We are approached by grade level teams energized by collaboration and by individual teachers with a project unique to one classroom. Their efforts and ideas deserve as much as we—and you—can give!

Jimmy Higgins: A Life in the Labor Movement

Ted Jordan, Cape Elizabeth High School Government and U.S. History teacher, carefully timed the CEEF funded presentation of the play Jimmy Higgins: A Life in the Labor Movement for January 10, 2011. By that date, the audience of CEHS students had recently covered the Gilded Age and Progressive Era of American History, and the performance provided a natural segue to introduce the beginnings of the labor movement.

Before his performance, Harlan Baker visited the students and introduced the leading figures of the labor movement. The main character of the performance, Jimmy Higgins, was the son of a newspaper man and became a reporter himself, covering the labor movement from World War I through the 1950s. The performance was coordinated to include members of the senior citizen community to foster a multi-generational talk-back session at the end of the play.

In the weeks since the performance, the students studied the end of World War I, the Red Scare of 1919-1920 and the conditions during the Great Depression. Jordan relays that many times during these studies, the students referred back to something highlighted during the play.
